Roles and Responsibilities

Caregivers can help the teacher and student get off on the right foot by informing the teacher of the child's history, needs and strengths before the child joins the class.

How to cope when a child gets off on the wrong foot at a new school.

Homework

When a child refuses to do homework.

- The work may be too difficult
- It may be a control issue
- Homework may be a new concept to the child
- Talking with the teacher
- Talking with the child
- Create a homework plan of action
- Working next to the child (paying bills, handling correspondence)
- Modeling appropriate behavior and focus
- Giving positive attention
- Communicating directly with the teacher about assignments

Behaviors at School

Getting to the bottom of the problem when a child acts out at school.

- Schedule a meeting with the teacher
- Make a list of concerns and questions and take it with you
- · Keep an open mind about the teacher's viewpoint
- Looking for patterns for when the behavior occurs (triggers)
- Rewarding small steps towards improvement
